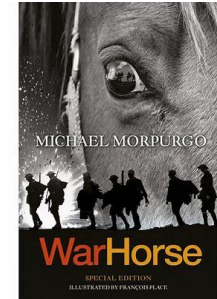




Owl Class — Term 1

English	Our English work this term will be linked to our history. Children will explore the genres of poetry and non-chronological reports.
Maths	Children will extend their knowledge of place value to the ten millions. They will learn good written methods for the four rules (add, subtract, multiply, and divide)
Science	Our topic this term is Classification and our Scientist for the term is Chris Nelson.

PSHE	We will be looking at the skills needed to work together as a team, including; negotiating, assertiveness, listening and building relationships.
Music	Children will learn about the instruments that make up an orchestra and will be exploring the musical genre Pop Art with Mrs Withers.

RE	We will be looking at the question: What matters most to Christians and Humanists?

Art	Children will carry out a study on WW1 Propaganda Recruitment posters then learn what screenprinting is and have a go at printing their own poster.

Core Text
